Nationwide, more than 1,500 veterans are dying each day with more than 30,000 per month.

That's why it's important for new veterans to join groups such as these. If people aren't members, then it's difficult to get the

These young men and women who are serving their country should be served by their country, which is what veterans organizations do. Many people, however, do not understand what these groups are about, he said, adding that wars weren't going on when many of the younger generations were growing up. "So, naturally,

the unhappy things were put out of mind."

Now, though, "it's there every day." And following the devastation of Sept. 11, it's understandable, he said. America fought back and stood her ground. "It's great," D'Andrea said of the nation's efforts. "I think America is great. I've been all over the world and there's no place like America."

same. Bonds are stronger, but fear is more

predominant With changes in airport security and terror initiatives established, Americans are thinking more about defense as opposed to offense. That's true with fire depart-

ments nationwide as well. According to Strong, classes are offered "all of the time" for terror and mass destruction training. The federal government has stepped up its financial assistance to fire departments, which has resulted in the

Logansport Fire Department receiving two grants for new airpacks, radios and equipment.

Even the general public has expressed a greater understanding of just how dangerous firefighting is.

Unfortunately, though, "it's taken a tragedy to get grants and notoriety," said Strong. The details associated with firefighting might be recognized more, but the job hasn't changed.

It's a dangerous job no matter what. A burning building is a burning building. There's fire, there's smoke - it's hot. "A fire burns just as hot here as in New York City." And on that fateful day in September

2001, "I doubt ... that those firefighters and police officers hesitated to help," said Strong.

Firefighters are taught to weigh the risks

against the benefits. With that many peo-

ple trapped, struggling to get out of the

burning buildings, benefits far outweighed any risks. That's something firefighters do every time they battle a blaze, said Strong. "You know that's what it's all about in this ser-

that will not be necessary for the city. "I'd say don't panic at this point," Franklin said.

"I've got to believe that before we would do a tax anticipation warrant, we could ask for a portion of our tax draw from the county as we have done before and there would not be any problem."

The city has sizable balances in other funds, he says. The County Economic Development Income Tax (CEDIT) has generated \$1.3 million in city coffers. The Fire Equipment Fund has \$547,000 and the Eastgate Property Fund has \$600,000. The Logansport Municipal Utilities also has positive balances.

Franklin said the spending slowdown will primarily affect spending over \$50, which will require a purchase order from the clerk-treasurer's office. "That could be a problem with some de-

partments, for example the fire department or the street department, if they have to fuel up the gas tank," he says. "It's nothing for us to fight a fire and fill up the tank with more than \$50 of gas afterward."

Parks Administrator Jan Fawley says the slowdown will probably hurt activities in her department. A Pumpkin Bash scheduled for next month with the Logansport Police Department will probably not be held, and some parks rest rooms at facilities where no activities are scheduled will probably be shut down earlier this fall than normal.

There will probably be no open gyms at Ben Long Center on Saturdays or Sundays but I think there were rentals in there anyway on many of those days."

Installation of new equipment at Spencer Park will probably be delayed, Helms said she has been asking city offi-

cials for a slowdown since last October. "I have periodically been asking for department heads to curtail spending," she said. "I'm not going to approve anything that is not essential to running the city."

Helms said given the time line involved with legally advertising for a tax anticipation warrant, it will not be a feasible option because the city will receive its draw by the time funds will become available.

Frustrated because she and her husband aren't back together yet, she admitted that life has come to a halt. It's a time warp that she can't exit. Life is passing by, but the Felkers, like thousands of other military families, aren't able to spend those passing minutes together.

Trying to ease the separation pain by talking on the phone every day, the couple has an average monthly phone bill of \$500 to \$600. "They're expensive calls," she said, "but

I want to talk to him. I miss him." Knowing she'll overcome any worries or fears about the future, she's not so sure about her son. "He and his dad are really close and when (Michael) left, it was very hard. He doesn't understand why his dad is away."

The effects of 9/11 are still going strong.
