

# Name for Social Security Must Be One Used in Work

**QUESTION:** I have two children born of the first marriage, both of whom are now married for the second time. Each one has a small name. Later on, what last name should the children use when it comes time to get them a social security number?

**ANSWER:** The application to obtain a social security number asks for the name of the individual as he uses it in his work or in business. It also asks him to show his name at the time of birth. It is immaterial which name a person uses, but the name shown on his social security card should be the same as the one he uses at work.

**QUESTION:** My husband was working at the time of his death making \$450 per month. Can I get full benefits as his widow at 60 or do I have to wait until I am 62 or 65?

**ANSWER:** You could receive a widow's benefit at any time after age 62 which would be figured at a full 82½ per cent of your husband's benefit amount. In other words, the amount you could receive as his widow would be just as much at 62 as it would be at 65. Effective September 1965, a widow could elect to start her benefits on her deceased husband's social security account at age 60 or later. Should she decide to start her benefits with the month she is age 60 her benefit would be reduced 13 per cent. If she started her benefits at age 60½ years or at another date nearer her 62nd birthday, the reduction would be a smaller percentage.

# Order Restricts Enlistments of Draftees in Guard, Reserves

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new order restricting enlistment of draftees in the National Guard and Reserves is aimed at halting the siphoning of men available for filling draft quotas, defense officials said today.

The Guard and Reserves have other manpower sources available to them without drawing on youths already tapped for induction, the officials said. This was the explanation given in response to questions about a Selective Service bulletin instructing local draft boards that young men under orders for induction no longer shall be allowed to sign up for the Guard and Reserves.

By joining the Army Guard or Reserves, a young man can escape two years of active duty. Instead, he serves only from four to 10 months in uniform getting his basic training and then, as a civilian, performs the remainder of his obligation, totaling six years, by drilling with his Guard or Reserve unit.

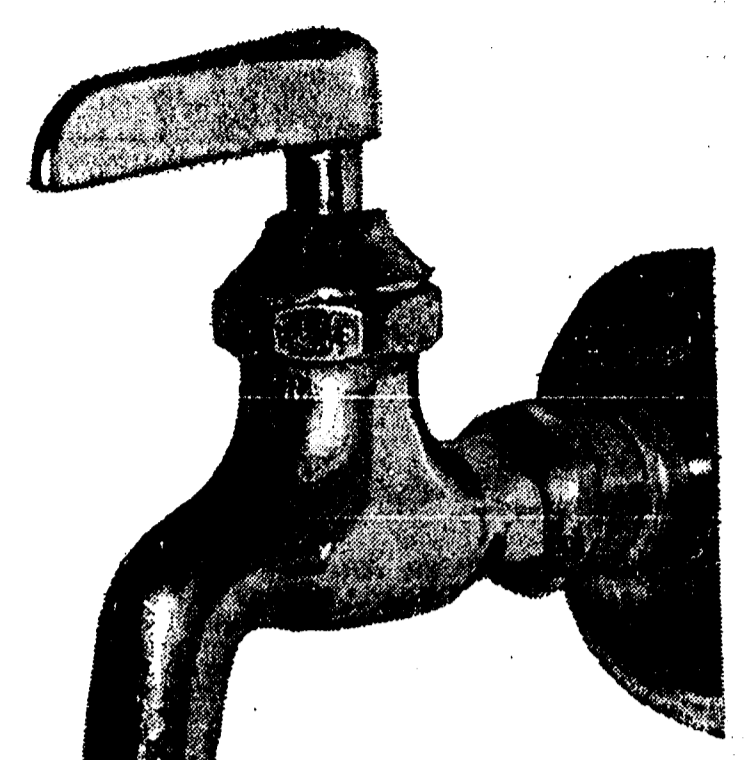
The Selective Service bulletin, distributed last week, permits cancellation of induction orders only for youths enlisting in the regular Army, Navy, Marines or Air Force.

The Defense Department said: It was recognized "that Selective Service boards had some problem in their pipeline process with people scheduled for induction who were siphoned off by enlistment into the Reserve-Guard, while on the other hand there are otherwise adequate manpower supplies for fulfilling Reserve-Guard requirements."

Currently, there was a backlog of 94,000 young men awaiting their four to 10 months of basic training after signing up with the Guard and Reserve.

Until that backlog eases many of these young men will undergo no training other than a sort of stopgap drilling provided by

their Guard or Reserve units. The backlog results from the heavy increase in the regular Army. Recruits for the regular service have priority in training at the various bases, leaving relatively few spaces for Guard and Reserve enlistees.

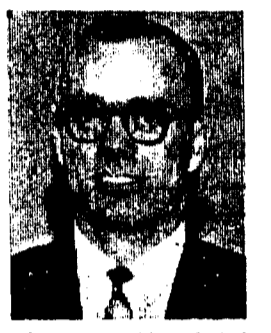
