# On Federal Taxes

What can be deducted by salesmen for the cost of operat-

You may be entitled to deduct 10 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business use and 7 cents a mile thereafter if you qualify, or you may deduct the actual cost of operation including depreciation. Of course, your car travel must be an ordinary and necessary business expense. These rules are explained in more details in the 1040 instructions.

I changed jobs last year and now find myself driving about 30 miles a day to get back and forth to work. Can I deduct 10 cents a mile for this driving?

No. Commuting to and from work is a personal expense and not deductible.

I am a teacher and took a summer course last year. Will I be able to deduct what it cost me?

The cost of the course will be deductible if one of the following two conditions are met: (1) the course was primarily for the purpose of maintaining or improving your present teaching skills; or (2) the education is expressly required by your employer to maintain your salary, status or job.

Is the retirement income credit the same this year?

No. The rate used to compute the credit is 15 percent for 1965 income compared to 17 percent last year. This is to keep in line with the reduced income tax rates for 1965. For an explanation of how to use this credit write your district director for a copy of Document 5018, Retirement Income and


