part rate increase is only a partial measure. He said the Federal Reserve Board still feels adoption of the 30 percent tax surcharge proposed by President Johnson is imperative.

An increase in the rate in December, 1965, coupled with other tightening techniques, raised interest rates to their highest in 40 years and dried up the supply of mortgage money.

Housing suffered a recession as a result but experienced a steady recovery last year.

Homebuilding and mortgage money are considered most vulnerable in a tight money squeeze.

The Times account continued: "The conversation with Mr. Kennedy left no doubt he had made a personal decision to enter in some fashion the intraparty struggle over the war in Vietnam and other issues. This was the context in which he said, 'Obviously, I can't support the President.'"

With McCarthy

Kennedy suggested he would like to cooperate with Sen. McCarthy.

Asked if he had a better chance than McCarthy to win the nomination, Kennedy replied he "wouldn't be considering doing it" if he didn't think he "had something to contribute."

The Times also reported on a lengthy New York meeting of Kennedy and his close advisers.

Sen. Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts, who has been advising his brother not to run, appeared to change his position.

Sorensen Opposed

Theodore Sorensen, an adviser to President John F. Kennedy, was the principal opponent of the idea of the New York senator's candidacy.

In Washington, one close Kennedy adviser is urging him not to risk his political career by fighting Johnson for the nomination.

Senator McCarthy, convinced Kennedy plans to join the race, is moving to head off the New Yorker in the remaining primaries.

McCarthy aides said the timing of his Thursday announcement that he will enter primaries in Indiana May 7 and South Dakota June 4 was prompted by a desire to get into these states ahead of any possible Kennedy candidacy.

McCarthy said he expected Kennedy to challenge him in California.

California Test

McCarthy is due to undergo a test of his strength compared with Kennedy's this weekend at a meeting of the 30,000-member antiwar California Democratic Council.

The council spawned the McCarthy movement in California but there is an undercurrent of Kennedy sentiment within the membership: The group is expected to endorse McCarthy overwhelmingly at the close of the convention Saturday.

McCarthy, indicating he was distinctly cool to the possibility of a Kennedy candidacy, said it might divide the bloc of opposition to Johnson's war policies and help the President win renomination.

The Minnesota voiced confidence he could win the California primary even if Kennedy makes it a three-way race. He suggested Kennedy might take more support from Johnson than from his own forces.

Morse View

He said he wasn't sure what the effect would be in Oregon. But in Portland, Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) said he has written Kennedy that if he joins McCarthy in the May 28 primary against Johnson, the vote will be split and "the President will undoubtedly get the highest vote" — and with it the state's 35 convention delegates.

Meanwhile, Richard Nixon made three stops during a one-day visit to Wisconsin. He said his analysis of the New Hampshire primary vote is that millions of Democrats will join independents and Republicans in electing a G.O.P. President in November.

"The possibility the former vice-president would win the Republican nomination was cited Friday by Vice-president Hubert Humphrey as one reason he thinks Democrats will be united behind President Johnson in November."

Tear Gas Training Given Youthful Non-Combatants

FORT LEWIS, Wash. (AP) — A dozen teenage youths ran coughing and crying from a building in a wooded area of this army post.

They were undergoing tear gas orientation Thursday, part of basic military training for the 225 high school youths who paid \$25 each and gave up spring vacation to attend.

There was marching and close-order drill and shouted commands from instructors. But there wasn't a rifle in sight.

The youths are non-combatants — members of the Seventh Day Adventist Church. The faith does not believe in killing, carrying weapons or working on the Sabbath but members do serve in the army.

Repaying Army

"We owe our allegiance to this country in every way possible except when it conflicts with the direct command of God. This applies to military as well as civilian matters," explained Lt. Col. **Charles Martin** of Washington, D.C., commander of the church's week-long medical cadet corps camp.

He said the training was to repay the army for allowing church members to perform military duties within the confines of their religious beliefs.

"We feel we owe a great deal to our country," Martin said. "With this training, we feel our boys can make a contribution to offset their limitations in the military."

The camp's 26 instructors are Adventists, the majority with some army and combat experience. Trainees bring their own food and bedding and do their own cooking in a vegetarian mess. The army provides housing in vacant barracks and a small amount of technical assistance.

Medical Aspects

The pre-induction training focuses on medical aspects of military services where most of the Adventists serve. An Adventist with some training is more apt to be relieved of duty on the Sabbath than an untrained one.

Members of the church are classified 1-A-O, available for non-combat military service. When inducted they are sent to Fort Sam Houston, Texas, for medical training.

Martin said 30,000 Adventists have taken the pre-induction training since it started in 1934. Many have served in the battles of several wars.

One, **Desmond Doss**, is the only non-combatant to win the Medal of Honor. He won it in World War II.

New Delay in Apollo Trip

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — The Apollo 6 mission director, **William Schneider**, said Friday that a problem with leaking valves in the spacecraft atop the second Saturn 5 moon rocket will delay the launch at least three days.

The important unmanned test flight, which already had been set back a total of seven days by several minor troubles, had been scheduled for March 28.

Sixth GI Leaves Sweden for U.S.

STOCKHOLM (AP) — The sixth U. S. serviceman to change his mind about taking refuge in Sweden to get away from the Vietnam war left for the U. S. Friday, American sources reported.

Informants declined to disclose his identity. They explained that in cases such as this, where the serviceman has not involved himself too deeply by actually requesting asylum and has had a change of heart, they feel he should be given a break.

"A face-saving gesture in cases as this might encourage others to return to their units," one source said.

Man Sentenced for Being in U.S. Illegally

Joseph H. LeVear, 47, of Hubbard was sentenced Friday to 18 months in prison by Federal Judge **Edward McManus**.

LeVear pled guilty Feb. 12 to an indictment charging him with being in this country illegally.

According to the indictment LeVear is considered an alien and a subject of Canada. He was arrested and deported from this county in 1959 and last year was found to be residing in Hardin county.

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Passing Through Crisis of Morals C.R. Group Told

"We are passing through a crisis in morals," said Dr. **George Forell** at the third in a series of Lenten luncheons Friday noon at the Roosevelt hotel.

Dr. Forell, the director and a professor in the school of religion at the University of Iowa, said, "It is not enough to say 'It is right' just because we have always done it that way. There are only a few people who do what they think is right and don't care what anyone else thinks."

"We are completely ruled by what others say. It is as the young people say—'Be with it—we do what other people do.'"

In reference to the natural order of things, Dr. Forell said, "One of the notions that has existed throughout time is the idea that there is some basic order to one's life and that certain things are agreed upon by men of good will."

"Sociologists say this is not necessarily true. They say we may order societies in many different ways and any organization is relatively as good as the next."

Absolutes Rejected

Speaking out against relativism and the new morality, Dr. Forell said, "We are a nation in which relativism is the undergirding philosophy. Absolutes are rejected."

"In the last few years, many theologians have given an unofficial approval to this way of thinking."

"I would, however, like to say a good word about the new morality. It is an attempt to adjust Christianity to a rapidly changing society."

He pointed out the vast amount of change that has taken place in the last 50 years by saying,
