### WAVERLY YOUTH ABDUCTED, THEN LEFT BY GUNMAN

WAVERLY, IA. — A 17-year-old Waverly youth told police here Tuesday that a man forced him at gunpoint to drive nine miles outside of Waverly, then took the youth's car, leaving him stranded on a country road in sub-zero weather.

The youth, Steve Pace, said that he walked the nine miles back to his home here, arriving about five hours after he had been abducted.

Waverly Police Chief Clarence Wickham said late Tuesday that there still was no trace of Pace's car. The boy's mother, Mrs. Maurice Pace, said her son told her that he was delivering copies of The Des Moines Register in the Wartburg College area shortly after 6 a.m. when a young man came out of a dormitory building and asked Pace to take him to a Quik-Trip store on Bremer Avenue, Waverly's main street.

Pace said that before they arrived at the store, the man told him to keep driving. The youth said the man produced a gun, according to Mrs. Pace.

The youth said the man directed him to the tiny community of Bremer, northeast of Waverly, and then to a point about a mile north of there when the man told him to stop the car because he wanted to drive. When Pace stepped out of the car, the man slid into the driver's seat and drove off.

Pace's parents began searching for him about 8 a.m. when he failed to return from his paper route to go to school. Police were notified about two hours later.

Wickham said Pace told him that the

man turned the car around and headed back toward Bremer after leaving him stranded on the road. Wickham said there appeared to be no connection between the incident reported by Pace and the murders in the past year of two young women — Julia Benning and Lisa Peak.

Pace described his abductor as about 21 or 22 years old, with collar-length hair.

### 800 VA patients back after heat restored

GREAT LAKES, ILL. They had been taken to six hospitals in Wisconsin and Illinois Monday when a boiler room fire at the adjacent Great Lakes Naval Training Center cut off the heat supply.

## SENATE FINANCE LEADER BACKS BIG TAX CUT

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Senator Russell Long (Dem., La.), chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Tuesday said a tax cut of \$10 billion or more will be necessary next year to stimulate the nation's economy.

Long said if he were President-elect Carter, he would propose a large, immediate tax cut when he takes office Jan. 20. Congress then could pass it by April, Long said.

"It looks to me as if the recovery is slowing to a halt," he told reporters at a luncheon. "I would hope that President-elect Carter would be asking us to do something right away."

Long, who engineered the 1/75 tax cut through Congress, said a tax cut will get through in 1977 only if Carter proposes it. "I don't plan to make any effort to initiate a tax cut," he said.

But Long made it clear he believes Carter's ultimate decision will be in favor of a tax reduction. The president-elect has said he will await fourth quarter economic statistics to be released before deciding on a tax cut.

The senator said he would be happier if the tax cut would be bigger than \$10 billion, which he described as a minimum. His proposal included a combination of tax rebates, individual tax reduction and business tax cuts.

"If you are thinking about less than \$10 billion, you might as well forget about it," he said. "It wouldn't upset me if he asked for \$15 billion."

By way of illustration, he said that perhaps 40 per cent of the tax cut could be in rebates — such as those approved in 1975. These are designed to give a quick boost to consumer spending.

Carter should consider increasing the investment tax credit or some other business tax cut, Long said.

Long said Carter's current plans call for a \$15 billion increase in federal spending to compensate for the sharp reduction in spending during the past few months.

He said Carter should go one step further and propose the tax cut on top of spending boost. Thus, Long recommended a tax-and-spending program of at least \$25 billion to stimulate the economy.

The program would spur consumer spending and business investment, and create new employment opportunities, he said.

### U.S., Greece agree on jet purchase

ATHENS, GREECE (AP) — Greece has reached initial agreement with the United States for purchase of additional F4 Phantom jet fighters, Greek sources said Tuesday.

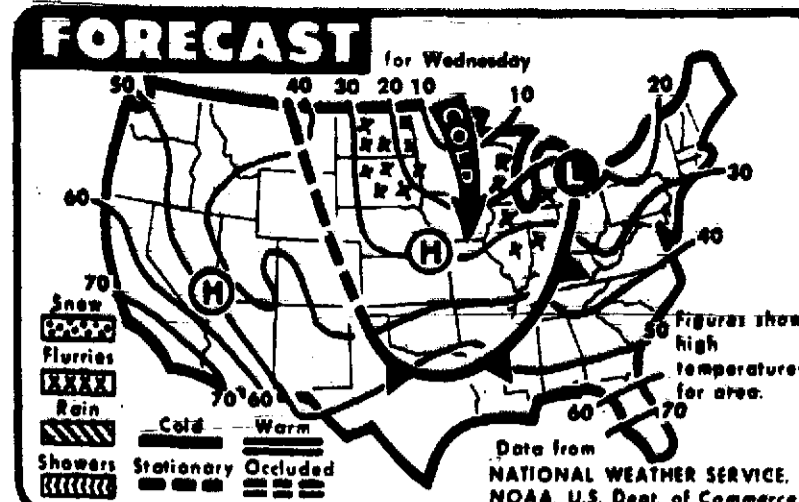
The sources said a letter of intent was signed recently but would not comment on reports that 24 aircraft were involved.

U.S. sources here denied local press reports that Greece was buying the Phantoms at twice the U.S. Air Force price. The sources said the price was the same — just under \$7 million each, without extras. Greece already has 38 Phantom jets, delivered in the last two years.
