

IRS Revokes Milk Co-Op's Tax Status

WASHINGTON (AP) --The Internal Revenue Service has revoked the tax-exempt status of the nation's largest milk producer cooperative and billed it for \$7.8 million in taxes and fraud penalties, apparently primarily because of political campaign contributions.

The IRS action surfaced in documents filed in U.S. tax court last month by Associat-Milk Producers, Inc., which came to light Tuesday. The San Antonio-based cooperative has obtained a tax court hearing of its protests that the IRS action is unwarranted.
