NEW YORK (UPI) - The stock market ran into profit taking problems Wednesday as the Dow Jones industrial werage approached the 1-000 level and prices turned mixed as a result in fairly active trading on the New York Stock Exchange.

Shortly before noon EDT. the Dow average was off 3.90 points to 992.69 after being ahead nearly two points at the outset. The blue-chip average on numerous occasions this year has run into profit taking pressures near the 1,-000 level.

. The closly watched average mined 7.48 points Tuesday, winning for the sixth time in seven sessions. In that time, the Dow gained more than 36 points following a recent slide of nearly 39 points.

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

# Limit Gains

CHICAGO (AP) - A private crop analyst estimated there would be less corn and soybeans produced this year than the government had forecast and several farm commodity futures advanced. to limits on the Board of Trade Tuesday.

\*\*\* Soybeans advanced 20 cents a bushel, soybean meal \$10 a ton, soybean oil 100 points, corn 10 cents, and oats 6 cents-all limits. Wheat futures closed 111/2 cents a bushel higher, far short of

the 20 cent limit. Conrad Leslie, an agricultural statistician and crop analyst, estimated as of September 1 the corn crop would total 5.98 billion bushels and sovbeans 1.25 billion bushels. The soybean figure was 18 percent under 1975 production. Last month, the agricul-

ture department estimated the corn crop at 6.19 billion bushels and soybeans at 1.34 billion bushels. High temperatures in August and not enough rain were blamed for the crop loss. At the close, soybeans

were up 20 cents a bushel, September 7.30; wheat was 11½ higher, September 3.301/2; corn was 81/2 to 10 higher, September 3.003/4 and oats were up 6 cents, September 1.74.

WASHINGTON (AP) -The senate water resources Wednesday subcommittee approved building a new 1,200-foot lock on the Mississippi river at Alton, Ill., according to Sen. John Culver

(D-Iowa). Culver's office said the subcommittee also voted to impose user fees on barges using the river and adopted a proposal by Culver calling for a master plan for using the upper Mississippi.

Replacement or repair of Lock and Dam No. 26 has been a controversial subject for several years.

A report by the U.S. corps of engineers earlier stated it would cost \$400 million for two new locks and it would be eight to ten years before the project could be complet-

The Iowa department of transporation has said only one lock should be replaced and a nine-foot navigation channel retained.

## Schaben Denies Livestock Count

DES MOINES (UPI) -James E. Schaben, former state senator and unsuccessful candidate for governor, pled innocent Wednesday in U.S. district court to a charge of illegally transporting 16 head of cattle across state lines.

Schaben, indicted by a federal grand jury last month, appeared before U.S. Magistrate Ronald E. Longstaff, who set an Oct. 12 trial date. The former state senator was released on his own recognizance.

Schaben operates an auction barn in Dunlap. He was accused in the indictment of transporting 16 head of cattle from Nebraska to Dunlap on July 25, 1975, knowing they had been exposed to brucellosis.

Following the indictment, Schaben charged that a "personal vendetta" touched off the investigation. He said Dr. Norman Kinney, the veterinarian who started the investigation, did so only after Schaben had been cleared of earlier charges that he sold livestock that were not properiy tagged.
