Unconstitutional

The children were placed in foster homes, but a U.S. district court judge last December ruled that a juvenile. court hearing at which parental rights were terminated been unconstitutional. had The children were returned to their parents.

But now, said Emery, it has become "quite apparent the Alsagers are not capable of rehabilitation."

The Alsagers were not available for comment on the petition filed in Polk county juvenile court charging that they had failed to adequately care for their children. It asked that the county be allowed to take custody of them.

Two homemakers and a financial caretaker assigned to the family by the county kept diaries. Based on those diaries, the petition alleged that sexual abuse and incest frequently occur among the children; that two of the older children threatened to kill two of the younger children, and that Mrs. Alsager last July threatened to kill the family, but said she "didn't have the guts" to do it.

Played in Freezer

The petitions also said that 4-year-old Sally Alsager was allowed to play in a walk-in freezer and occasionally smoked cigarets, that the Alsager house was littered with dirt and garbage and that Charles Alsager lost his job as a taxicab driver at the beginning of the year and has not had a regular job since.

Emery estimated his department has spent \$44,000 on the Alsager family from September, 1975, through last month for salaries of the three workers assigned fulltime to the family, aid to dependent children grants, other general relief and the cost of foster care when several boys were removed from the home temporarily.

He anticipates approximately 90 percent of the patients at Glenwood and 87 percent of those at Woodward will qualify. There presently are between 700 to 750 patients at Glenwood and 650 at Woodward.

"Ultimately," said Burns, "we think this per diem (from the federal government) will amount to about \$30 per day for the patients who qualify."

Basically, said Burns, each cottage contains 6,000 square feet and costs roughly \$290,000. This includes all site preparation, paving, sewer and the like.

Use Will Vary "Once the cottages are completed, the use of the existing buildings will vary. Some of the buildings are being remodeled for program usage, others will be demolished. Some will be used in part only, such as the first floor," said Burns.

Rivers, Streams Near **Record Low Levels**

has summer-long drouth dropped lowa's rivers and streams to or near record low levels, and officials are wary about possible cutbacks on water use.

The Mississippi river at Davenport stood at 2.6 feet Wednesday, a tenth of a foot above the record low set in August, 1941.

Barge line operators are being advised not to overload their barges, said Bill Koellner, chief of the U.S. army corps of engineers regulation section for the Rock Island district However, navigation is still possible because of the lock and dam system.

"These are exactly the conditions for which the system was built in the 1930s," said one official.

The Des Moines river at Fort Dodge is at a record low, but the situation is somewhat better at Des Moines, where the Raccoon river adds its waters.

A flow of at least 300 cubic feet per second is needed out of the Red Rock reservoir on the Des Moines to adequately supply cities downstream. But the flow Wednesday was


