Tumey retrial nears completion

Gazette staff writer TIPTON — The retrial of Dean Tumey is coming to an end here with a prosecutor insisting that Tumey "knows too much to be innocent" and the defense urging jurors not convict the wrong man just to close a 191/2-year-

old case. Lawyers began their closing arguments Friday afternoon and will complete them Monday before the Cedar County jury here begins to decide if Tumey murdered Sandra Jo Pittman, a 17year-old Davenport female, on Sept. 17, 1980.



A first jury in the first-degree murder case was unable to reach a decision. It voted 7-5 to acquit before giving up Oct.

and beating Pittman to death and leaving her body at a rest stop along Highway 30 west of Clarence.

Tumey, who was 35 and on disability for mental illness at the time, was acquainted with Pittman because they both lived for a short time in a Davenport rooming house.

Central to the case is a confession Tumey allegedly gave to an Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) agent and former Cedar County Sheriff Keith Whitlatch in 1990 in Fairfield.

"Dean Tumey knows too much to be innocent," prosecutor Alan Ostergren thundered Friday afternoon at the start of his closing argument to the jury.

The confession, which authorities say is a paraphrased account of Tumey's admissions in 1990, correctly mentions what Pittman was wearing at the time of her death, how her dead body was laid uncovered in the rest area and that she was strangled.

Defense attorneys Brad Norton and Tumey, 54, is accused of strangling Brian Fairfield of Lowden have said the confession is in words Tumey would not

that authorities made public in the first hours after the murder, and is not signed by Tumey.

Tumey, who has suffered from paranoid schizophrenia since the early 1970s, confessed to get attention to and to get admitted to the hospital, defense attorneys have said.

That delusions and psychosis of his mental illness have long dogged Tumey is not in dispute, prosecutor Ostergren, assistant Muscatine County attorney, told the jury Friday.

However, just because a person thinks the CIA is chasing him doesn't mean that he can't honestly admit to a murder, Ostergren said.

Defense attorney Fairfield told jurors have used, includes only information that certain things in the purported 1990

confession don't square with what the murderer did to Pittman.

He said Tumey's alleged confession says he strangled her with his hands, when ligature marks also were apparent on her neck. The confession also says it was raining when Tumey allegedly laid Pittman's body in the rest area, though her clothes were dry when her body was found by railroad workers a few hours after her death. Fairfield said.


Prior to the first trial, Tumey told the prosecution's psychiatrist that he did not kill Pittman, but watched as three

The defense has suggested that several others in Pittman's circle, including a boyfriend at the time who asked associates how to kill her, could have committed the murder.

Fairfield asked why Tumey, a suspect from the start, hadn't been arrested earlier if the case against him is so

"Don't convict the wrong man just to close a DCI file," he told the jury.
