John H. Pazour, 71, of 1925 Douglas Court, former mayor and retired postmaster and a resident of Marion for the past 65 years passed away at 11:25 a. m. Tuesday, Nov. 7 in a Cedar Rapids hospital. He was born the son of Peter T. and Mary Tople Pazour on Feb. 12, 1901 at Savanna, Ill. On Dec. 23, 1933 at Lancaster, Mo. he was married to Ellen Nemecek.

Mr. Pazour served with the U. S. Navy during World War I; he was an inspector with the State Motor vehicle department from 1928 to 1933; Mayor of Marion from 1933 to 1941; chief traffic weight officer of the State Highway Department from 1941 to 1955; and Postmaster of Marion from 1955 to 1965. Mr. Pazour was a life and charter member of Marion Post No. 298 of the American Legion, Past District Commander of the American Legion; Charter Member and Past Commander of Veterans of World War I of Linn County; a member of Post No. 788 of the V. F. W.; member of the National Association of Postmasters of the United States; and of Trojan Lodge No. 548, A.F. & A.M.

Surviving are his wife; two brothers, Peter Pazour and William Pazour, both of Anamosa; and a sister, Mrs. Betty Duffy of Cincinnati, Ohio. He was preceded in death by three brothers, Frank, Louis, and Joseph Pazour; and four sisters, Mary Lane, Victoria Clellow, Florence Wilkinson and Marion Pazour.

Services were held at 1:30 p. m. Thursday, Nov. 9 at the Murdoch chapel in Marion, conducted by the Rev. Charles Moore. 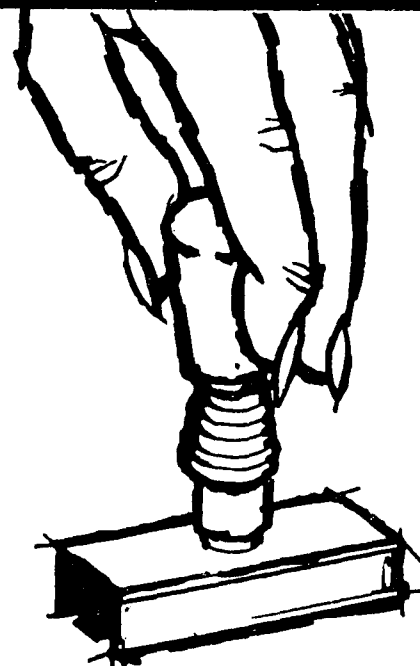
