Officials of the Cedar Rapidsbased utility said the increase would amount to a year-around average of \$2.06 a month for its 110,000 residential customers in Iowa. Such an increase would produce \$5.3 million a year more in revenue.

Iowa Electric has asked that it be allowed to start collecting the higher rate, under bond, Oct. 15. However, sources said it is unlikely the state will permit a suspension of the rules. That would delay the rate increase until Jan. 15.
