The nation

The cold front which was responsible for the shower and thunderstorm activity in the central U.S. on Tuesday and in the eastern U.S. on Wednesday is now crossing the central Atlantic Coast. Shower and thunderstorm activity ended this morning along the north Atlantic Coast and by tonight over the mid-Atlantic Coast. Due to the slower southward push of the front, showers and thunderstorms will be slower in ending along the eastern Gulf Coast.

The unseasonably cool temperatures of Wednesday morning in the mid-Mississippi Valley have moderated, however another surge of cool air was moving southeastward across the central Plains and into the mid-Mississippi Valley.

Showers and thundershowers were scattered through the Pacific Northwest and northern California into the northern Rockies, and are spreading slowly eastward.

She got suspicious when 'assessor' ran

Helen Tate became suspicious Wednesday when the man who told her he was an assessor left her house by running out the back door and jumping over a fence.

Tate called police, and the officer's report gives the following account:

At 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, a man appeared at Tate's door at 1705 11th Ave. SW and told her he was an assessor. He showed identification, but Tate couldn't make out what it said. The man looked over her house, asked if she lived alone and asked if she had made improvements to the house.

He had her sign some papers that she was unable to read. The man then left by a rear door, jumped a fence and ran away.

An anonymous caller to police today described another incident that had suspicious overtones.

A man appeared at a southwest Cedar Rapids residence and said he was selling ads for a state police magazine, the caller said.

Both police and the city assessor's office had advice on what to

look for if a stranger knocks at the door.

"There is no reason why an assessor shouldn't hand over his or her ID for you to look at," said Dale Piersall, city assessor. "It has their photo on it and their description," Piersall said. "It also has my signature as well as the signature of William Stewart, president of Vanguard Appraisal, the firm that has been contracted to reassess property in Cedar Rapids."

Assessors avoid unnecessary questions, Piersall continued, "although they might start a little conversation to take the strain out of the situation. And they shouldn't be running out the back door and jumping over fences."

"Ask for identification," said Capt. Howard Gardner of Cedar Rapids police. "Even if they are selling ads for the state police magazine, they should have identification. If they won't show an ID, don't talk to them. Don't let them in."

"And call us. We like to check on that kind of character," Gardner said.

2 men plead guilty to assault charges

Two Cedar Rapids men pleaded guilty in Linn District Court today to charges stemming from separate incidents in which each was accused of assaulting a woman.

Cedar Rapids Michael Cannon, 30, pleaded guilty to terrorism, third-degree sexual abuse and possession of a firearm as a felon in connection with a June 30 incident in which he was accused of kidnapping a 20-year-old Hiawatha woman at gunpoint.

James E. Thompson, 22, pleaded guilty to assault with intent to inflict serious injury in connection with a July 18 incident in which he was accused of injuring his former wife, Ann Thompson, with an icepick and threatening his two children.

Thompson received a suspended sentence of two years in prison and was placed on probation for two years after the victim asked Judge Thomas Horan not to place Thompson in prison.

Cannon is to be sentenced Oct. 23 at 2 p.m. He must serve at least five years in prison since the terrorism abuse charge involved use of a firearm.

Cannon pleaded guilty following a plea bargain in which the county attorney agreed to seek dismissal of a first-degree kidnapping charge, which carries a mandatory life sentence.

The plea bargain also involved dismissal of numerous other counts of possession of a firearm as a felon and agreement that the sexual abuse did not involve use of a firearm.

Use of a firearm in a sexual abuse puts the offense in the second-degree category, which calls for a 25-year sentence. The third-degree charge to which he pleaded guilty carries a sentence of 10 years in prison and an optional fine of up to \$5,000.

The terrorism charge carries a five-year prison term and an optional fine of up to \$1,000. The firearm possession charge carries a sentence of up to two years or a fine of up to \$5,000 or both.

Springville man killed; bicycle hit

A rural Springville man died this morning after the bicycle he was riding was struck from the rear by a semitrailer truck.

Dead is Richard Chesney, 47, of Route 1, Springville.

According to the Linn County Sheriff's Department, Chesney apparently was en route to his job at Rockwell Collins in Cedar Rapids at about 6:15 a.m. when the accident occurred on Highway 13, north 2½ miles from the Highway 151 junction.

Authorities identified the truck driver as Michael Estling, 31, of Lamont.

A sheriff's spokesman said acquaintances reported that Chesney rode his bicycle to work daily.

Chesney was taken by ambulance to St. Luke's Hospital, where he died at 8:07 a.m.

According to reports, both the Chesney and Estling vehicles were traveling south on Highway 13 in the early-morning darkness. A sheriff's spokesman said Chesney had lights on his bicycle, but it had not been determined whether the lights were on when the accident occurred. The investigation is continuing.

Murdoch Funeral Home in Marion is handling funeral arrangements.

Cause of death found in Amana homicides

AMANA — Cause of death has been established in the deaths two St. Joseph, Mo., residents found murdered Saturday at the Amana Holiday Inn on I-80 near Williamsburg.

Dr. Stacey Howell, Iowa County Medical Examiner from Amana, told The Gazette this afternoon that Rose Burkert, 22, and Roger Atkinson, 32, died of acute blood loss and brain injuries.

He said Atkinson suffered lacerations to the scalp, skull and brain, and that Burkert suffered lacerations to scalp and skull and a brain contusion. Both suffered bleeding under the brain covering, Howell said.

Although sources close to the investigation said earlier this week the wounds were caused by an ax-like instrument, Dr. Howell said this afternoon that "we're not saying what kind of instrument (caused the injuries), because we still don't know."

Asked if the injuries were consistent with those that could be inflicted by an ax, Howell said, "That's been the common rumor, but I don't know the particular reason why it should be, rather than some other kind of instrument."

He refused to say whether the wounds were to the back or front of the head, but other sources said the wounds were to the back of the head and to the hands, as if the victims had tried to shield their heads against an attack from behind.

In the meantime, Iowa County and state law enforcement authorities have interviewed hundreds of persons in connection with the murder and are asking anyone who may have been driving in the vicinity of the Amana Holiday Inn Friday night or early Saturday to report any unusual activity he may have observed. A hitchhiker, or perhaps an unusual car, are among things lawmen want to learn about.

and to artillery exchanges the same day at Qasr-e Shirin.

On Wednesday, Iraq abrogated a 1975 border accord with Iran because of the frontier fighting that intensified in recent weeks.

In fighting Wednesday, the communique said, the Iranian forces had failed to recapture the Khan Leyli and Zeynal Kosh heights from the Iraqis, but elsewhere, enemy attacks had been repelled.

In another report, Tehran radio said acting Joint Chief of Staff Brig. Gen. Fallahi and the land forces commander had conferred with Bani-Sadr today on the situation in western Iran and the combat readiness of the armed forces in the border area.
