CEDAR RAPIDS

Ernest Kosek, 92, a resident of Cottage Grove Place, passed away Aug. 31, 1999, after a sudden illness.

He is survived by his son, Ernest G. Kosek and wife Susan of Cedar Rapids; a daughter, Karen V. Nelson of Minneapolis; a sister, Rose Prastka; eight grandchildren, Geoff Kincaide and wife Julie, Wendy Ferrari and husband Mike, Stephanie Kincaide, Lisa Nelson Abrahamson and husband Chuck, Todd Nelson, Brook Adkins and husband Rob, Jennifer Rinas and husband Josh and Angela Kosek, as well as four great-grandchildren, Victoria Adkins, Eleanor Rinas, Alison Kincaide and Eva Abrahamson.

Ernest Kosek was born in Cedar Rapids on March 13, 1907, in the Kosek Bakery on 16th Avenue, now known as Sykora's Bakery. At the age of 6, he moved with his family to Taylor, Ark., where his family owned a sawmill and timber company. After 10 years, the company burned and his family returned to Cedar Rapids, where Ernest attended and graduated from old Washington High School located in downtown Cedar Rapids.

During the summer months he would lifeguard at Ellis Park Beach. He then went on to study at Coe College, played college football, then transferred to the University of Iowa, where he played football and graduated with an electrical engineering degree and a minor in money and banking in 1931. He received a commission in the Army Engineers and was accepted for training as an Army Air Corps Cadet. In 1932, Ernest left the Army Air Corps, worked for one year in investment banking and, in 1934, started his own investment banking business — Ernest Kosek and Company, which he successfully ran for 40 years.

With other Iowa investors, Ernest started the Iowa Fund. Together they were responsible for the Development of Affordable Housing in the Fairfax area. He also served on the Board of Governors of the National Association of Securities Dealers.

In 1934, Ernest married Vlasta Victoria Vondracek in the Coe College Chapel. Ernest served in the Navy during World War II as a Lt. Senior Grade. He was a Dispersing Officer for the 3rd Naval District, stationed in New York City, where he helped set up some of the first discharge centers.

Ernest was also well known in the political arena in Iowa. He served 23 consecutive terms on the Linn County and Cedar Rapids School Boards. He served as a state representative and a state senator to the Iowa Legislature for 18 years. He co-authored the bill which resulted in the construction of Interstate 80. Ernest also served on the Money and Banking Committee, Ways and Means Committee, and the Health Education and Welfare Committee. He championed many mental health bills helping to advance the plight of those affected by mental illness. He also served on the executive committee of the National Association of Mental Health.

Ernest was a member of First Presbyterian Church, El Kahir Shrine, the Odd Fellows, Elks, the American Legion and was a 32nd-degree Mason. He was also a long-time member of the Cedar Rapids Country Club, the Sokol, the Iowa Republican Party, the Czech Heritage Society, the Czech Village Association and Western Fraternal. Ernest and United State Senator Hruska started the first English-speaking lodges in the Western Fraternal.

Ernest Kosek was preceded in death by his wife of 64 years, Vlasta; his parents, Charles and Anna Hradecky Kosek; four brothers, Charles, George, Frank and Otto; and a beloved daughter, Ann Jeanette Kincaide.

Ernest Kosek was a pillar of strength and a leader to emulate. A man who knew no boundaries when it came to love and generosity. He never ceased to maintain a positive attitude, and saw only the good in others.

His family and friends feel a great loss, but feel blessed to have been touched by his life.

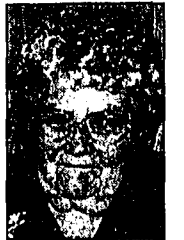
Dear Lord,

WHAT OFFICIAL INFORMATION ABOUT ME MIGHT I EVER NEED?
When accurate information is needed to fill out forms and announcements, it is often hard to locate or remember. You need all sorts of information when you marry, buy insurance, apply for credit or a job, and yes, even when death occurs.

It is wise to prepare such a total record now and keep it in a safe place ... not in a safe-deposit box because they are usually locked until after the funeral, but rather in a locked drawer of your desk. Do, however, inform your spouse where this information may be found.

Information most often needed includes: 1) full name, address, social security number, armed forces serial number, 2) birthdate and place, 3) blood type, 4) employer records, 5) name of father's and mother's birthplace and date, 6) names of organizations and publications to be notified, 7) location of important documents, 8) any special funeral preferences or prearrangements, 9) prearranged donation of eyes or body organs, 10) names and addresses of all persons to be notified of your death.
