Marion residents find solutions for troublesome basin

Residents of the Sunburst Avenue neighborhood are trying to gather solutions from the city for a troublesome city-owned retention basin problem. Sheryl Knodle, Tree Board Member, along with about eight other neighbors spoke in front of the council last Thursday on how to resolve the problem regarding the basin that runs through this neighborhood. Members spoke about the build-up of silt and compost in the bottom of the basin. The basin is home to the run-off from rain, which helps prevent flooding. Lilac trees were planted along the bank of the basin to replace weeds and to aid in reducing flooding. These plants are also used to help soil erosion. Neighbors want to keep this area as clean as possible and take care of it for small wildlife. The council will meet with contractors to help find solutions to these

problems, such as maintaining the

basin by mowing around it.

Local student and Mount Mercy SIFE team place internationally

Mount Mercy College senior dents prepare an annual report and Shaylee Knudtson of Marion is a member of Mount Mercy's "Students in Free Enterprise" (SIFE) team that placed among the top 48 teams in the SIFE International Competition May 22 and 23 in Kansas City, Mo. Mount Mercy received two perfect scores and beat the national champions from Canada and the Ukraine to win second runner-up.

The seven-student team presented its summary of annual service projects to a panel of 15 judges and won second runner-up in its division and \$750.

"The experience was incredible for the students," said SIFE adviser and Mount Mercy assistant professor of business Tom Castle. "We received recognition at the awards banquet and had lunch with the president and CEO of Johnson Wax."

In April, the SIFE team won the St. Louis regional competition - a \$1,500 prize — to advance to internationals. Also, for its work teaching disadvantaged children, Mount Mercy earned the "Special Competition: Success 2000" award and an additional \$1,000 at the St. Louis competition.

The 1999-2000 Mount Mercy SIFE team completed 26 projects, volunteered over 1,200 hours, and educated 1,600 people about the principles of free enterprise.

Students In Free Enterprise is a non-profit organization that provides college students an opportunity to establish a variety of community outreach programs that teach the principles of free enterprise. Each year, more than 800 colleges and universities from all over the world compete in SIFE regional competitions. Stu-


