Gazette staff writer CEDAR RAPIDS — More than a ton of blankets and warm clothing is making its way from Cedar Rapids to Afghanistan.

The Seattle-based aid agency, World Concern, will distribute the donated assets of another group were frozen agency to deliver the items donated

Global Relief Foundation was shut down by the U.S. Treasury Department in December, just after the Cedar Rapids group Women for Peace arranged to have donations from its clothing drive delivered by the group.

The Chicago-based Global Relief, which had offered to pay half of a \$5,000 shipping cost, is accused of funneling money to the al-Qaida terrorist network.

Women for Peace, which formed after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, had items, an arrangement made after to scramble to find another relief

The shipment of 2,885 pounds of goods, which left Cedar Rapids on Thursday, should reach Seattle by the end of the week.

"We were very pleased," said Zeineb Mehdi of Women for Peace. "It was a big sigh of relief. I think it was heard all over Cedar Rapids."

Computer Transportation Services of Denison, in western Iowa, arranged for the national carrier, Roadway Express, to carry the 10 pallets of goods to Seattle at a reduced cost of

when World Concern takes the goods to Tajikistan and through the northern border of Afghanistan, Mehdi said. The items should arrive there by the end of February.

Sen. Chuck Grassley's office provided Women for Peace with a list of relief organizations. Mehdi said many of those groups, like Global Relief, had already been shut down by the government, however.

"God was watching over us," she said, of World Concern's cooperation.

Mehdi said about a dozen people helped sort items at Cedar Graphics From there, no cost is expected in Cedar Rapids. Packages were la-

beled in English and in Farsi, a language similar to Arabic. Packaging was provided by Midamar Corp. of

Cedar Rapids. Any surplus money — the group collected nearly \$1,500 -- will be sent for food relief for Afghan refugees.

Mehdi praised the residents who donated clothes and blankets.

"People were still bringing stuff" as the truck was being loaded, she said. adding the Roadway truck driver was "very patient."

Convicted murderer's 2nd trial begins today

Gazette staff writer CEDAR RAPIDS - A Des Moines man already sentenced to life without parole for the 1993 strangling death of a hotel guest will go on trial today in Cedar Rapids for a second, similar 1997 murder.

Donald Piper, 40, is accused of stabbing and strangling Zurijeta Sakanovic, 21, at the Clive Budgetel on Sept. 4, 1997. Sakanovic, a Bosnian refugee, was employed at the hotel as a

Donald Piper Sentenced to life in prison for D.M. murder

Cedar Rapids after a survey indicated the Polk County jury pool was tainted by its knowledge of the first trial.

Judge Linda

Piper was convicted June 4, 2001, of first-degree murder in the strangling death of Patricia Lange, 36. Her body was found in a room at the University Park Holiday Inn in West Des Moines the night of Aug. 22,

Piper was employed as the maintenance chief at the hotel until two months before Lange's death. His DNA was found in the victim's room.

He is a suspect in a third motel murder that remains unimmigrant Mariana Redroban led police to believe Piper might be a serial killer. Like Sakanovic, she was at work as a motel maid when she was stabbed to death. She was found by her supervisor in a Sunday at San Francisco Interguest room at a hotel in West national Airport, the FBI said. Des Moines.

Thomas Boyd of the West Des Moines Police Department, "Piper has not been eliminated as a suspect in Redroban's murder.'

No charges have been filed against Piper or anyone else, and the case remains under investigation, Boyd said.

DNA linking Piper to the Sakanovic crime scene led prosecutors to charge him with murder. Jurors in the Lange case said DNA evidence convinced them of Piper's guilt.

Piper is currently being held in the Polk County Jail, according to Polk County Assistant Attorney Steve Foritano.
