

Yank Division Nears Border Of Manchuria

Seventh Is Only 2 Miles Away From Its Goal

Marines Push Toward Big Reservoir; Foe Begins Digging In

(By The Associated Press) SEUL, KOREA.—American infantry paced by tanks surged down a snow-covered north Korean valley late today within two miles of the Manchurian border. A 10th corps spokesman said leading units of the U. S. Seventh division were only two miles from their goal, the border town of Hyesanjin, at 4 p. m. (1 a. m., CST).

He said the troops probably would wait until Tuesday before pressing into the town.

Red resistance, sporadic to light earlier, dwindled to "practically none" by late afternoon, the officer said.

Monday's push carried the troops 11 air miles closer to the border. The advance represented a chilling march of more than 15 miles over the winding road through Korea's northeastern mountains.

British commandos moved up to join U. S. marines in a push through the central mountains around Changjin reservoir.

Simultaneously, the commander of the Philippines battalion in the U. N. force asked that his outfit be returned home because it was not fighting as a unit. The Filipinos are guarding a vital supply line with the U. S. 187th airborne regiment.

U. S. Ambassador John J. Muccio, just returned from Washington, said "the new menace" (Red China) would not check the determination of U. N. governments "to see this thing through." He added, "Korea's friends are on the march."

Fireman Dies; \$250,000 Loss In Bluffs Blaze

Another Injured; 3 Buildings Destroyed; 21 Families Routed

COUNCIL BLUFFS, IA. (P)—Fire swept a downtown business block early today leaving one fireman dead, another injured and damage estimated at about \$250,000.

Twenty-one families were routed in an adjacent apartment building which had only slight fire damage.

The fireman, William Cavitt, collapsed while running from the falling wall of a burning building. He died in a hospital. Acting Fire Capt. Earl Hansen received a hip injury when he fell on icy steps.

Fire Chief Waldo Merrill revised his earlier damage estimates from \$100,000 to \$200,000 after viewing the fire damage area in daylight.

A. J. Morphy one of the owners of the Morphy Drug company, which was not attacked by the flames, but which had smoke, water and heat damage, estimated his firm's loss at \$50,000.

The blaze apparently started in a three-story brick building in the 100 block of South Main street housing Nick's Tavern and the south Main Furniture company.

It quickly spread to an adjoining four-story brick building housing the Kattenman Hardware company, which carried one of the largest stocks in southwest Iowa. Also destroyed was the Breeder Supply company warehouse to the north of the hardware store.

Firemen saved the main breeder supply building just north of the warehouse and the large Morphy Wholesale Drug company to the south of the burned area.

One Omaha fire unit in addition to five Council Bluffs pumpers fought the blaze. Power was also knocked out in the area near the fire.

Among plants affected by the loss of power was the Council Bluffs Nonpareil. The newspaper was enlisting the help of commercial printing establishments unaffected by the fire to help prepare type for today's editions.

At 8 a. m. there was no indication when power would be restored.

The power loss was spotty and it was impossible to determine at once how extensive it was.

Loyalty Sunday Attendance 83%

COLUMBUS, O. (P)—The American Lutheran church at midmorning reported an average attendance of 83 per cent of membership at loyalty Sunday services yesterday.

But, said a church spokesman, only 82 per cent of the churches had reported. The report was complete for only two states: California with 95.3 per cent attendance, and Iowa with 79 per cent attendance.

Loyalty Sunday is designed by the Lutheran church to stimulate regular attendance by special emphasis on getting out 100 per cent attendance for one Sunday.

Mrs. Walz was born Anna Kellner March 9, 1863, in Wiesenfeld, Germany. She had lived in Carroll county since 1889. Her marriage to Sebastian Walz took place April 27, 1889, in St. Bernard's church here, with the late Rev. Conrad Schulte officiating.

The couple lived in Breda, where Mr. Walz operated a cream station. After his death March 8, 1911, Mrs. Walz lived with the Boes family, with whom she made her home 38 years.

Surviving are her daughter, Mrs. Joe Boes, Breda; a step-daughter, Sr. M. Sebastian, St. Francis hospital, LaCrosse, Wis.; two brothers, John Keller, New York City, N. Y., and Isadore Keller, Davenport; nine grandchildren and 27 great-grandchildren. Mrs. Walz was a member of St. Bernard's church and the Christian Mothers sodality of the parish.

Mystery Blast Wrecks Home of ISC Professor

Dr., Mrs. A. R. Lauer Out of Town; Investigation Launched

AMES, IA. (P)—The white frame bungalow of Dr. A. R. Lauer, Iowa State college professor who specializes on traffic safety, was wrecked a few minutes before midnight last night by a mysterious explosion. Dr. and Mrs. Lauer were attending a meeting at Cincinnati, O. and no one was home at the time of the blast.

The Ames fire chief's office said it was unable to find any immediate cause for the explosion. The state fire marshal's office has sent an investigator. The gas line leading into the house had been shut off, the fire chief's office said.

The house, which is located at 2328 Storm st., several blocks south of the Iowa State college campus was lifted off its foundation. A raincoat blew underneath and was caught between the superstructure and the foundation when the house settled down.

The explosion apparently originated in the basement. Two minor fires broke out there after the blast. These blazes were put out by firemen who got the call at 11:50 p. m.

The east wall of the house was blown out. A grand piano appeared to have been lifted nearly to ceiling height by the blast. Its legs buckled as it dropped back down.

The outside chimney collapsed. Windows and the front door were blown out. No official damage estimates were available. Furnishings and other contents of the dwelling were damaged and scattered throughout the residence.

U.S., Red Jets Battle Six Miles Up

WASHINGTON, D. C. (P)—One of the highest air battles in history was fought over Korea yesterday by navy Panther jet fighters and seven to nine Russian-built MIG-15 jets.

The navy, reporting today on the encounter, said it took place at an altitude between 32,000 and 35,000 feet or a little more than six miles in the air. It ended quickly with the communist planes streaking to safety across the Manchurian border.

Two of the Red planes were last seen losing altitude rapidly and trailing smoke as they glided across the Yalu river, a navy spokesman told reporters at a Pentagon briefing.

Mr. Chambers, Carroll high school coach, received a cut on the head and Mrs. Chambers a wrist laceration and bruises in the crash. They were passengers in a car driven by Gene Knutsen, Grinnell. Almost a dozen cars were involved in the accident when a deer was struck by a car. Traffic along the highway was heavy because of the football game.

Expect Assembly to Reject Russ Plan

NEW YORK CITY, N. Y. (P)—The United Nations general assembly is expected today to reject Russia's demand that it accept a series of Soviet conditions as preliminaries to starting work on a 20-year peace plan.

Sen. John Sparkman (D-Ala.), a U. S. delegate, denounced the Russian proposals as calling for a complete U. N. surrender on major issues as the price of Soviet cooperation. They included immediate admission of the Chinese communists to the U. N., an assembly pledge not to try to get around the veto and prohibition of the atomic bomb.

Sparkman declared that "this bartering of peace on the part of the Soviet union is something that the free world cannot accept."

Members of the 80-nation assembly are expected to show their agreement with this view by spurning a Soviet resolution in which the demands are made.

3 Inches of Snow Falls in Carroll Area

(Compiled From AP and Local Dispatches) Near zero temperatures were recorded in Iowa today as the first general snow of the season blanketed the state. The mercury slumped to a chilly four above freezing in Carroll following a three-inch snowfall yesterday afternoon and evening.

Most of the state received an inch of snow or more. Atlantic reported the state's low temperature, two above zero. Numerous points in the state had 10 above or colder.

The four above reading in Carroll was the coldest mark of the season here.

Highways in Carroll county were near normal today, Carl Kobold, county foreman of the State Highway commission, reported.

All icy spots have been sanded and most of the packed snow removed. The only slick spots remaining on county highways are in sheltered areas, Mr. Kobold said. Slippery highways were blamed for numerous accidents late yesterday and last night. After dipping to four degrees at 7 a. m., the temperature climbed to 16 by 10:30 a. m. today. Yesterday's high reading was 27 above. The forecast called for clear and cold weather for the Carroll area tonight and Tuesday, with a low of eight degrees Tuesday morning.

Iowan Found Shot to Death

HARPERS FERRY, IA. (P)—Leonard Garin, 46, who farmed near Harpers Ferry was shot to death last night and a 45-year-old woman in whose home the body was found was held today for questioning.

Sheriff William Huffman of Allamakee county said the woman is Mrs. Clem Cassidy of Harpers Ferry, wife of a railroad worker and mother of four children. The sheriff said no charges had been filed.

Garin was shot through the chest with a .22 caliber bullet. The sheriff said he apparently had been slain but that investigation of the case was incomplete. Garin roomed at another house in this Mississippi river hamlet.
