What he has benefited the most from West Sioux is an education to be used in the future. After graduation he will probably go to college or join the Navy.



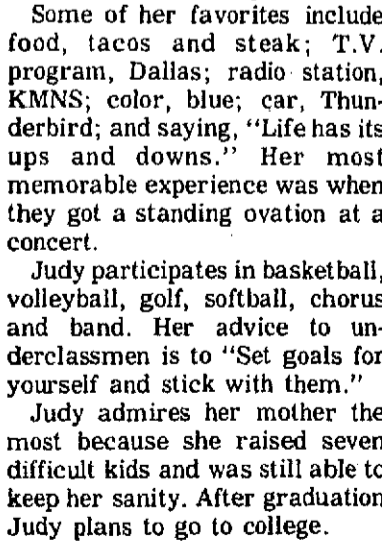
Lisa Vander Esch
