Sioux Center boy begins rabies shots

A four year-old boy began rabies shots on September 10 after a search to find the dog that bit him proved fruitless.

Joel Feekes, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Stan Feekes of Sioux Center, was playing in a neighbor's yard last Tuesday afternoon with two neighbor kids when the youngsters saw a dog in the bushes. When Joel went to pet the animal, the dog snapped at him, just barely breaking the skin. "It

was more of a bruise than a bite," says Stan Feekes.

In an effort to find the dog to see if it has rabies, or not, the Feekes contacted the police, put the description of the dog on KVDB radio for two days, contacted all the schools to get the information out to all the students, and they also talked to all the veterinarians in town to see if they knew of any dog fitting the description.
