## NITC to offer seminar on alcoholism

Northwest Iowa Technical College is offering a workshop on Alcoholism to licensed nursing personnel and to anyone interested in the problems of alcoholism on Friday, December 5, 1980, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., at the Royal-Fork located on Highway 60 North, Sheldon, Iowa.

This workshop will be offered in two parts. Attitudes, Pathology, and Early Identification will be discussed in the first session. The participant will have an increased awareness of the multifaceted dimensions of the alcohol-related problems, will be able to explore the origins and effects of personal attitudes on the delivery of care to clients with alcohol-related problems, an increase of knowledge of the pathophysiology and progression of alcoholism and will be able to identify skills essential for the early identification of alcohol-related problems. The second session of the alcoholism workshop will be held in April.

The presenter of the workshop is Constance Smith Peterson, R.N., M.S.N. She was an instructor in community nursing at Creighton University, Omaha, Nebraska, and is presently studying for her doctorate. Ms. Peterson was involved in writing the curriculum for the Federal Government on alcoholism.

## Funds to assist elderly in fuel costs available

Financial assistance for low income individuals to pay fuel bills will be available again this winter.

In a recent conversation with the Upper Des Moines Opportunity office at Emmetsburg, we were pleased to hear that assistance is on the way. However, we were also informed the cash will not arrive until the end of December or middle of January. Also, only about 20% of eligible clients will receive help, because there will not be enough money to go around.

Fuel assistance funds will therefore be distributed on a basis of "who needs it most". That need will be determined by: 1) Total income you receive; 2) Type of fuel you use (i.e.: propane, wood, fuel oil, etc.); and, 3) Basis of need (i.e.: is it an emergency?). There will be other eligibility factors as well.

If you received help with your fuel bills last year, chances are you qualify again this year. However, you will probably receive only about half as much! This year, the program is designed to cover about one-half of your bills.

Although applications will not be available until December, county offices of Upper Des Moines Opportunity are taking names right now.

To have your name placed on their list for an application, call their office in each county seat town. It is listed as Upper Des Moines Opportunity or U.D.M.O.

If you are handicapped or home bound, making it difficult for you to get into town, call anyway. A representative will come to your home with an application.

For a quick guess whether or not you are eligible, note the following income guidelines:

## Calculate Your Small Business Needs Before Buying A Computer

"Going on computer" is an important step in your business, so before you buy or lease a microcomputer be sure it can be programmed to meet all of your company's needs, say the Iowa Society of CPAs. The computer hardware (the keyboard, video screen, memory, storage and a processor) is only half the story. The other half is the software (programs), which instructs the machinery to perform in certain ways.

You can select "canned" or packaged programs and adjust your business practices to them, or you can hire a programmer to tailor programs to meet your firm's specific needs. While a canned program may be adequate and less expensive, you should find out if a tailored program will pay for itself over the long run, since you won't have to rearrange any of your established business systems to suit the program.

Take a look at your business and determine what functions the computer must handle. Properly programmed, a microcomputer system should be able to post information to various bookkeeping accounts, keep track of inventories on a daily basis, provide instant statistical reports, handle the payroll and print checks and invoices as well as mailing labels.

Another area of programming you'll want to pay attention to is that of accounting and auditing. CPAs say that computerization increases auditing capability, as the computer can examine a company's accounts and statements in ways that would be too expensive and time-consuming if performed manually. Receipts and files will remain in the computer's memory, minimizing incorrect records because something was lost or misplaced. Be sure that the computer will leave a clear "audit trail" so that errors can be traced.

Bringing a microcomputer into your company does require some changes. Your bookkeeper, office manager and auditor will have to familiarize themselves with the new "employee", and learn how to talk to it. Microcomputers are programmed in "BASIC" ("Beginner's All-Purpose Symbolic Instruction Code") to respond to simple English commands. After a bit of training, your staff will be able to "talk" to the computer (and if programmed to do so, the computer will thank them for their instructions!).

How much will a microcomputer cost? Hardware and software together can cost from \$20,000 to \$100,000. You can lease computer equipment, eliminating the need to tie up large amounts of working capital. Whether you buy or lease, get at least three bids, as prices will vary from one company to another. Remember that when the system is "down" no work gets done, so be sure your service contract provides for a technician to fix the equipment quickly on your premises.
