The Oelwein "B's" rallied in the last quarter but were unable to equal the opponents' score. Randallia's team work led by Buechele, who was the high point man of the game, who had 10 points to his credit, forced Oelwein into the defensive. McCormick was high point man and outstanding player for the "B's" scoring a total of 5 points. Most of the points but a few long shots were tried during the course of the game. There were numerous fouls on both teams. The Oelwein "B's" were handicapped throughout the game by poor passing; and, though they tried many times at the basket, only a few shots were effective. The "B's" although they were defeated held Randallia down to the smallest number of points this season and scored more baskets than any other team has so far.
