DISCHARGE ERNEST HELLER AS INNOCENT

Man Held For Investigation Following Murder of Ashley Downing Near Westgate Is Given His Liberty Ernest Heller, who has been confined in the county jail for the past few months charged with complicity in the murder of Ashley Downing near Westgate, was released from custody this week after the grand jury failing to find sufficient evidence to longer hold him on the charge. It will be remembered that Mr. Downing was killed about three o'clock on the afternoon of Wednesday, January 4, 1933. He was an aged man, living alone on his farm about two miles from Westgate. He had been shot through the back of the head with a shotgun and whatever money he had was missing. He was a large land owner and was reputed to be quite well fixed financially, having made many loans to those who needed the money. So far as known he had no enemies who would want to take his life and the theory has been advanced that the murder was committed with the idea of robbery as about a year and a half previous to this two men robbed him at his home of whatever money they could secure. No one seems to have been suspicious of the cold blooded murder until Heller was placed under arrest. He had told a number of conflicting stories as to his whereabouts, but it seems to have been known he had been cutting wood in the vicinity of the home at the time of the murder. Neighbors in that vicinity heard the shooting but thought it was hunters and paid no attention to it and it was not known a murder had been committed until a couple of hours later when a couple of men buying chickens called at the home and discovered the body lying on the floor. Every effort has been made by the state department of justice and by the local officials to secure a confession from Heller and other clues have been investigated, all without avail. The murder at the present time seems to be one of those unsolved mysteries with the grand jury refusing to indict on the evidence so far secured.

He leaves a wife, one daughter, Mrs. Essie Butler, and two sons, Fred and Edward, all of Oelwein. The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at three o'clock at the Brant funeral home, conducted by Rev. Hauser. Burial will be in Woodlawn cemetery.

CONFESSED TO THEFTS IN OELWEIN

It seems that Claude Howard is again in the toils, having been out of prison but four months on robbery charges. He served a sentence in Illinois and while confined there admitted he had entered among numerous others, five homes in Oelwein and robbed them in 1928. The following is the news story sent out from Charles City where he is being held for robbing 13 homes in Nora Springs: Claude Howard is held in jail here in connection with thefts in 13 Nora Springs, Ia., homes Tuesday and Thursday nights. Sheriff H. P. Atherton said Friday that in Cambridge, Ill., in 1928, Howard was sentenced to four and a half years imprisonment for a series of house robberies in Geneseo, and that he was released from Joliet prison four months ago. A confession Howard signed then at Cambridge, according to the sheriff, says he entered five homes in West Union, Ia.; three in Hawkeye, Ia.; five in Fredericksburg, Ia.; six in Maynard, Ia.; six in Nashua, Ia.; four in Waverly, Ia.; three in Waterloo, Ia.; six in Nashua, Ia.; four in Cedar Falls, Ia.; six in Grundy Center, Ia.; three in Riceville, Ia.; five in Cedar Rapids, Ia.; five in Oelwein, Ia., and five in Charles City.
