Priest tells ministers from Page County the Catholics and Protestants nearer together

Church leaders of the Page County Ministers Association heard first hand the personal evaluations of the world-wide ecumenical movement when they had the Rev Ralph Sturn from the Catholic seminary at Conception, Mo, as speaker, meeting Monday at Shenandoah.

Ministers felt they had heard an outstanding leader, had gained insight into the closing differences between the faiths, and listened intently as the priest told of the ecumenical meetings held during the last two years. The talk was significant, too, by being given on the day which opened another world-wide meeting.

Much will be done on the local level towards unifying the Christian faiths, Father Sturn emphasized to his Protestant listeners. He pointed to the changes during recent years which have been evident, practices which have shown the Catholic and Protestant faith nearer to being one. He praised the late Pope John for his work towards bringing faiths together.

He reminded that not long ago an English Cardinal had seemed successful in having the Revised Version of the Bible adopted by his church, with 20 footnotes added. But final decision was cut short by his sudden death.

He paid tribute to Clarinda's priest, Fr Jerome Schnitker, who was killed in a highway accident. The Clarindan was counselor for scores of young priests who came to his home for assistance and advice during their studies at Conception. Fr Sturn gave a broad invitation to visit the seminary at Conception.

Questions were generous from the ministers as they sought to learn more concerning the differences between the faiths.
